HIPAA Violation Leads to Criminal Conviction of Former Patient Coordinator

A former Patient Information Coordinator (Patient Coordinator), previously employed with UPMC and its affiliate, Tri Rivers Musculoskeletal Centers (TRMC) in Mars, Pennsylvania, pleaded guilty to a charge of wrongfully disclosing health information, in violation of the Health Insurance Portability and Accountability Act (HIPAA). The FBI led the investigation that revealed the Patient Coordinator improperly accessed the individual health information of 111 UPMC patients who had not received services at TRMC. Additionally, the investigation uncovered that the Patient Coordinator unlawfully disclosed personal gynecological health information related to two such patients, "with the intent to cause those individuals embarrassment and mental distress."¹

It is rare that a HIPAA violation leads to criminal prosecution and should serve as a warning to facility employees with access to protected health information who might be tempted to violate HIPAA for nefarious reasons. The Patient Coordinator could face up to 10 years in prison, a fine of \$250,000, or both for violating HIPAA laws. The Court will sentence the employee on June 25, 2019.
